I certainly have no doubts we will be able to deliver a wide suite of subjects; ranging from work readiness, to allied professional and ATAR pathways.

We have also begun to undertake various excursions and take advantage of incursions to help our students experience various potential careers. Starting those conversations about what life might entail after school, and ensuring that everyone to has as much information as possible to help make decisions about senior schooling.

Their commitment to ensuring that we continue to look for ways to improve and support each other in exploring the next step; no matter what that is, or what it entails.

# Chaplain's Address

Emotional coaching: what is it and can it help?

**Generation Next** have a library of valuable resources on a variety of mental health topics. In <u>this Generation Next podcast</u>, **Andrew Fuller** and **Maria Vakakis** discuss emotional coaching as a parenting strategy.

Maria Vakakis says, "emotional coaching is a parenting philosophy looking at how we learn and develop the ability to identify emotions and how we then behave in response to those emotions."

We all need to be able to identify and name our emotions, as well as accept them and set boundaries in our response to them. Some responses to emotions are not helpful and through seeking connection with our young people, we can help them to develop better communication around emotions. This also supports better friendships and minimises risk taking behaviour in response to an emotion.

Many of us have little experience sitting with uncomfortable feelings and considering our response before action regarding our emotion.

I invite you to listen to this <u>podcast</u> and become the emotional coach in your family.

# **Academic Extensions Update**

In our extension **English** classes, teachers have been using questioning and dialogue to guide students into:

- Thinking
- Inferring
- Analysing
- Transforming text ideas into the bigger themes and ideas.

Students can then relate these to social contexts and ideologies.

This term has seen students from 8.1 and 8.5 complete a multi-modal research task for their novel study in English. The students had to research the author and inspiration for the novels, creating a biography from their research. In addition to this, they completed a comprehension task, analysing the setting, characters, themes, and genre.

In **Maths**, 8.1 have been applying their understanding of shape, size and volume to make recommendations for a rabbit hutch. They then needed to apply their hutch to particular monetary constraints and sell their idea to Mr Giddings.

In **Science**, 9.1 and 9.5 will be applying their understanding of homeostasis to an investigation looking at how exercise causes changes in the human body, and what the body does when returning to normal conditions.

All Achieve classes will soon begin working on their end of term cross-curricular tasks, applying what they have learnt throughout the year in Maths, English, HaSS and Science to achieve a goal. Their amazing work will be on display during Week 10. Watch this space for more information.

# Senior School and Beyond

With CLC moving into senior school in the near future, we are developing our networks and partnerships to provide meaningful opportunities for our students to make informed decisions for their futures.

We began by exploring networks such as the **Bindjareb VET Network** to explore senior school options. We have also formed a connection with **South Metro TAFE**. Year 9 students have begun to utilise these budding relationships, with a recent incursion with South Metro TAFE. These partnerships will allow for students to pursue a range of qualifications and complete apprenticeships.

CLC have existing partnerships with many **Universities**, which we are developing for students on an ATAR pathway. These partnerships will provide students with a sound understanding of entry requirements, as well as the course offerings each University have.

Through our ANZAC Ceremony, we have been able to form a strong connection with the **Australian Defence Force**. Students with an interest in a defence career, can utilise this connection to explore their options.

Earlier this term we developed a relationship with **Roy Hill** mining company after attending the ROC-Ed program with some of our Year 9 students. This partnership will allow our students, both ATAR and VET bound, to explore careers in the ever-growing mining industry through incursions and excursions that Roy Hill offer CLC.

Year 9 students in the Achieve program, have already had the opportunity to attended several incursions and excursions. All of these events, focused on future career prospects and helped to broaden the understanding of in demand jobs and careers.

In week 8, students who are interested in a career in construction have the opportunity to attend the **Construction Training Fund**, participating in a day of interactive learning about the construction industry.

CLC will be holding a **Year 10 parent and student pathway planning information** session at the start on Term 2 next year. Students will also be invited to discover careers they may be interested in at the **Careers Day** on **23 May 2022** hosted at CLC.

We look forward to continuing to network with our community and develop opportunities for the future of our students.


# **House Activites Update**
