#### **Business Plan**

Coastal Lakes College has an unwavering commitment to high quality teaching which drives the College vision to ensure success for all students. Our commitment to quality teaching is reflected in Business Plan priority 1, Excellence in Teaching and Learning and underpinned by our



Teaching, Learning and Assessment Framework which we strive to have teachers implement in every classroom, everyday. Target 1 in our College Business Plan states, "The Coastal Lakes College Teaching, Learning and Assessment Framework will be implemented consistently across the College"

The Coastal Lakes College Teaching, Learning and Assessment Framework outlines our College's shared approach to teaching and learning and clearly outlines what effective teachers believe, what they know and what they do to maximise the achievement outcomes of their students. There is a growing body of evidence to indicate that other than the student themselves teaching quality has the second greatest impact on student achievement outcomes. Additionally, we know that schools are most effective when there is an evidence based, consistent approach to teaching that is predictable to students and embedded across the whole school.

To help ensure our Teaching, Learning and Assessment Framework is implemented across the College we engage in 'instructional rounds' that involves Executive Team members, Heads of Learning Area and our Instructional Coaching Team observing teacher's classroom practice. We collect data during these observations which then provides a learning area snapshot to the Head of Learning Area on how many teachers are implementing the necessary instructional practices that form part of our Teaching, Learning and Assessment Framework. A summary of this data is then taken back by the Head of Learning Area to provide feedback to their respective team on the instructional practices observed which serves to validate current practice or inform the need for teaching adjustment. At the whole-school level this data is then used to inform College's the progress towards the achievement Business Plan target 1, with updated data provided each term. To support teachers to effectively implement the CLC Teaching, Learning & Assessment Framework. The College Executive

have appointed trained instructional coaches who are expert teachers, trained to work shoulder to shoulder with teachers to help them improve their instructional practice in alignment with CLC's Teaching, Learning & Assessment Framework and their goals for improvement.

### White Card Course - Oct 25th

Coastal Lakes College hosted a second White Card course which was another huge success, 20 students and 1 teacher achieved their White Card certificate. A White Card (or general construction induction card) is required for workers who want to carry out construction work. Any person who wants to access a construction zone is required to hold this card. It is fantastic that we had so many of our students complete this course in 2023 and we look forward to hosting this course again for students in the future.

### TIMSS – ACER

The Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS) is a large-scale assessment that measures how effective countries are in teaching mathematics and science. In 2019, 64 countries, 580,000 students, 571 Australian schools all participated in this assessment, and it has grown since.

Coastal Lakes College was selected to participate in this global test in 2023. We had 2 classes of Year 8 students (50 students in total) participate in this assessment in Week 4. All students did their very best and made the College and teachers very proud. We look forward to seeing how Australia scores in this area. #### Wellbeing and Engagement Collection Survey

The Wellbeing and Engagement Census took place for the second time in Term 3. The census survey gives the students the opportunity to have a voice about how they are tracking academically and socially at school. Students were asked a variety of questions in the confidential anonymous survey. Upon completion of the survey, the College was provided with a report describing the views of students across Years 7 to 11 regarding their social and emotional wellbeing, their engagement at school and their experiences outside of College.

The College has been busy exploring the WEC data from the report, identifying indicators of wellbeing, analysing the impact of student wellbeing on academic achievement and planning a path moving forward to better support all of our students here at the College. The data from 2022 demonstrated that 50% of the College's students arrive to school without a healthy breakfast, prompting the College to work hard in 2023 to establish a robust Breakfast Club allowing students to access breakfast, which we all know is the most important meal of the day, setting students up with the fuel they need to be successful in the classroom. We look forward to putting the 2023 feedback into action and seeing where it takes us in 2024!

### Learning Area Update - English

The English Learning Area's teaching focus is on developing the language and literacy skills of all students. However, alongside functional English, learners are also charged with developing subject-specific conceptual understandings and analytic practices. Like all College Learning Areas, we have a continuum of specific skills, terminology, ideas, knowledge, and understandings that students are expected to know and apply.

We use the Western Australian Curriculum and SCSA courses of study to develop programs designed to engage our students in activities that extend their skills, knowledge and understanding of the English language. In doing this they reflect on the world around us, whilst concurrently developing and enhancing their ability to comprehend, respond and create a range of text types.

It's been an interesting 2023 and Semester Two for our English staff. Alongside the journey of establishing the resources and curriculum for our Year 11's, we have reviewed what we deliver for Year's 7-10 and started planning and resourcing our Year 12 courses. There have been weekly after-hours meetings to achieve our review as well as to regularly moderate student assessments.

Some of our 2023 highlights include: some excellent essay work and speeches from our Year 11 ATAR students; some wonderful business ideas, product models and presentations from our Year 11 General students; many engaging creative writing pieces from our Year 10's, 9's and 8's; many fantastic bookmark entries and poetry anthologies from our Year 7's (some displayed in our library); and enthusiastic participation of staff and students in our annual Book Week costume day (when staff dressed up as book characters and students entered a competition to guess who they were dressed as). I am proud of our highly qualified and very committed English Learning Area staff and the achievements of our students.

Next year the College continues to grow and our foundation Year 7 students (and those who have joined that cohort along the way) move up to be our first Year 12 cohort. I remember teaching them as chirpy Year 7's ... and here they are already young adults moving into their Graduation year. I wish them a successful final Year of College but, until then, a happy and safe school holiday season to all.

#### Reading

This year all students have had the opportunity to regularly read books of interest to them in their English class. In every class this is either part of a daily routine, or there is a dedicated lesson every week for reading. This part of the English program is based on research that shows that regular reading fosters development of a student's vocabulary and essential foundational literacy skills, such as spelling and paragraphing and the sequencing of ideas.

Students have been encouraged to borrow a book from the College or community library, bring one from home, or to borrow one from the books provided in each classroom. Students are also encouraged to regularly read at home.

### Learning Area Update - English

#### Year 7


In Term 4, Year 7 students will be exploring the world of poetry, where they will be challenged to respond to existing poetry and tasked to create and present their very own poems based on the work of Roald Dahl. So far, students have been exposed to poetry's different elements and forms, with limerick and nonsense poetry quickly becoming firm favourites among the cohort. We cannot wait to see the fantastic work the students produce!

#### Year 8

Year 8 has been an exciting time in English as we have explored a variety of topics this term! To finish off 2023, students will be analysing a range of songs and their lyrics for their use of poetic devices, as well as how Australian stereotypes are represented in music videos.

#### Year 9

In Term 4, students will aim to gain an understanding of the science fiction genre through a variety of short stories before writing their own. It should be an exciting term with possibilities "out of this world".



#### Year 10

Year 10, the final year of 'Middle School' for students, is an exciting year where students are having to fully consider what Senior School Pathways suit their subject skills and interests. How committed are they to finessing their reading and writing skills and the practices of reflection and continual improvement? Can they deconstruct a range of text types, as well as create their own examples of specific fiction and non-fiction texts? The territory of where each student currently sits regarding this has been provided to them through feedback on their comprehending, responding and composing skills across a range of Tasks. These have included a novel study, a short film study, and the writing of essays, opinion pieces and short stories.

#### Year 11 General

The roll out of a Year 11 General course has been an exciting addition to the English curriculum. Designed with the intention of widening student's experiences of everyday texts, students have engaged with imaginative, informative, and persuasive texts in a variety of forms and for a variety of reasons. Students have been invited to analyse, respond to, and create their own texts which has given many students an opportunity to showcase their skills in different ways. This year, highlights have been the creative tasks, the most popular of which has been the 'Shark Tank Sales Pitch'. Students busily researched and made products, prepared presentations, and tried to sell their idea to a panel of their peers who were often hard customers. Their powers of persuasion are impressive.

#### Year 11 ATAR

Our first year of Senior School ATAR! Over this term, our Year 11 ATAR English students have been putting the world to rights in their interpretive pieces, sharing their opinions about issues that affect them. Now they have begun preparing for their final exams of the year, working away at unpacking questions, writing practice pieces, and memorising textual evidence. We wish them the best in all of their exams and are looking forward to reading their insightful responses.

#### USA Basketball Tournament Tour


